What is Food Insecurity?

- Lack of consistent access to enough food of all household members to have an active and healthy life.
- Limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate foods.
- Many factors contribute to food insecurity
- 1 out of 8 Americans and 1 out of 6 children are food insecure




Food Insecurity Statistics for NYS⁽¹⁾

2020 1,882,580 people were reported as food insecure

2022 - 2,638,700 or 1 out 7 people in NY were food insecure



23% of those considered food insecure were above the SNAP threshold



42% of those considered food insecure were above the SNAP threshold



Food Waste in the US

- More than 44 million Americans lack reliable access to nutritious meals. (1)
- Meanwhile, 80-100+ billion pounds of food go uneaten in the U.S. each year or 30-40% of the country's entire food supply. (1)
- Effective January 1, 2022, the <u>NYS Food Donation and Food Scraps</u> Recycling law requires businesses and institutions that generate an annual average of two tons of wasted food per week or more must: (1)
 - 1. donate excess edible food; and
 - 2. recycle all remaining food scraps if they are within 25 miles of an organics recycler (composting facility, anaerobic digester, etc.).



Food Recovery in NY

- There are many organizations throughout NYS providing food recovery and distribution services
 - 8 organizations canvassed in upstate, Hudson Valley and Long Island recovered
 6 million pounds of food from over 240 sources and distributed to over 350 recipient organizations
 - Feeding Westchester recovered and distributed 21 million pounds in 2023
 - City Harvest has recovered and distributed over 1 billion pounds of food in 40 years!
- The focus for all is to recover and distribute good healthy food!
 - 75% of the food recovered and distributed by City Harvest NYC is produce
- Food Recovery organizations report that the number of people needing food has increased from 20% to over 100+% since the pandemic!



Food Recovery Presenters

- Many types of Food Recovery organizations:
 - Organizations picking up prepared food from hotels, restaurants and event venues.
 - Farms and Cooperatives connecting with Food Recovery organizations
 - Individual or collaborative organizations picking up directly from stores, farms, bakeries, etc. and distributing to local food pantries and meal programs.



CCEOC Gleaning Team


Crist Bros Orchards, Orange County NY had 1600lbs of apples



PROBLEM: Food Insecurity in Rockland

- ➤ Over 49,000 people are living below the poverty line in Rockland. That's 1 out of every 7 people. (US Census Bureau)
- > 17% of children in Rockland are defined as food insecure by Feeding America.
- > 25% of children in Rockland County live in poverty (US Census Bureau)
- ➤ 4 in 10 Rockland residents (over 130,000 people) are economically insecure, living in households that lack the income to meet the basic cost of living, including essential items such as housing, child care, food, transportation, health care, and a smartphone plan.

 (United Way, ALICE Report)
- (Officed Way, Alliel Report)
- ➤ These statistics are disturbing and unfortunately similar to many communities across NY State.







RESPONSE: KEY PROGRAMS

- > TOUCH launched the GET FRESH program in 2011 with RCAH and works with the Food Bank of the Hudson Valley and the Food Bank of Northeastern NY to organize weekly mass distributions of food to local pantries.
- ➤ TOUCH also manages **Hunger Prevention & Nutrition Assistance Program (HPNAP)** and **FEMA Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP)** grants to serve those in urgent need.
- > Through all our nutrition programs we have distributed food for over eight million meals in Rockland County over the past decade!
- ➤ In response to the pandemic, we increased the **Get Fresh** distributions to weekly, arranged no-contact drive through pickups for safety and partnered with **Rockland Conservation Corps volunteers**.
- ➤ TOUCH recognizes that food can be medicine and is committed not only to preventing hunger but also to promoting health through better food choices. Our nutrition programs are informed by the expertise of a Registered Dietitian who also gives individualized counseling to our clients through our **Eating Well Medical Nutrition Therapy Program**.



PREVENTING HUNGER AND REDUCING FOOD WASTE

TOUCH and our partners make a difference every day but we need to do more.

We coordinate pickup, delivery and distribution of over 25,000 lbs. of food per week that would have gone to landfills, instead feeding the most vulnerable in our communities.

Primarily through Retail Store Partnership Agreements with the Regional Food Bank we pick up from over 20 stores and distribute to over 40 pantries and feeding programs.

TOUCH and The RCAH Coalition:






Wasted Food Scale

Self-Reported Food Insecurity Among Adults 2023



- Overall percentage is
 24.9%
- Counties outside of New York City with the highest percentages are Herkimer (28.8%), Oswego (26.2%), and Rockland (25.8%).



What is CHOW?

- Starting in 1976, CHOW is the Community Hunger Outreach Warehouse in Binghamton NY.
- It is a network of food pantries located in Broome County with the goal of making emergency food available to people requiring short-term assistance
- CHOW is a program of The Broome County Council of Churches, a network of 100+ congregations and our programs operate in an interfaith way.
- In 1985, CHOW began it's Food Recovery Program
- All food is distributed at no cost to over 115 emergency food programs

CHOW Community Hunger Outreach Warehouse



- Recovered and distributed 2.66 million pounds of food in 2023 alone
- Operates 5 days a week with multiple trucks
- Embarking on recovering prepared food
